Born: 28 Feb 1893 St John, Jersey, Channel Islands

Parents: Francis Kerambrun and Marie Lannon (married St John Jersey 13 Feb 1892)

Family: Married Catherine Ryan in Ayr, Scotland 4 Feb 1913 – one son John born Ayr,

Scotland 1914 (no birth record found)

(Wife Catherine Kerambrun remarried in 1921 in Ayr, Scotland, Robert Armour – they moved to Australia and were living in West Kempsey, McCloy River, NSW, Australia)

Occupation: Seaman (UK) and Railway Worker (NZ)

Family emigrated to New Zealand 1914 – living 16 Craven St, Napier

John worked for the Railways as a labourer in the Running Shed at Napier.

Military Service: Attested: 4 Oct 1916 at Napier, New Zealand

According to his military record he previously spent 1 year in the Jersey Militia and 1 year in the New Zealand Engineers

Service: Rifleman, New Zealand Rifle Brigade (1st Battalion, 3rd NZ Rifle Brigade, "D" Coy)

Service No: 38180

Died: KIA 2 Jan 1918, In the Field, Belgium


