

Memorials - Liz's List, May 2008

This list is adapted from Bernard Mann's list, which contains all of the Bailiwick's war memorials. I have selected from his list the memorials commemorating the Great War, and added to it some individual memorials that I have come across in local cemeteries. I have not included war graves - only memorials to those buried elsewhere.

Castel Parish

Ladies' Guild memorial, in Parish churchyard.	Yes, 2006	Stone cross inscribed "Pro Patria". To the memory of the brave Castel men who laid down their lives for their country in the Great World War 1914 – 1918. Erected by the Ladies' Guild, St Marie du Castro. (No names).
Parish memorial, inside Parish church.	Yes, 2005	Wooden wall plaque with names of all parishioners who died in WW1. Listed by name and rank. Those lost in both World Wars, including members of the French Army.
Individual memorial plaque inside Parish church	Yes, 2006	Brass plaque in memory of Major George Le Page, KIA at Loos 26/01/1916, erected by D Company, the Guernsey contingent, R.I.R.
Individual memorial plaque inside Parish church	Yes, 2006	Brass plaque in memory of 2 nd Lieut. Jack Harding, KIA Neuve Chapelle, 26/10/1914.
Deslisles Methodist Church memorial and altar ornaments	Yes, 2006	Brass wall plaque, stating that "This tablet, the altar cross and vases are in grateful and honoured memory of all those associated with this church who served in the Great War and the Second World War, 1914 – 1918, 1939 – 1945".(No names) Brass cross and two vases, apparently made from Great War shell cases.

Parish memorial, Parish church	Yes, 2005	Lych-gate with wall plaques either side. Casualties from WW1 listed on one side, WW2 the other. French Army listed separately.
St Yves R.C. church memorial.	Yes, 2006	Plaque from the former St Yves church, Forest, inscribed with a list of parishioners killed in WW1, plus "Pro Patria, 1914 – 1918, now on base of crucifix in St Joseph's Presbytery garden, St Peter Port. Visit by permission of the Parish Priest.

St Andrew's Parish

Parish memorial, Parish church.	Yes, 2006.	Wall plaque inside Parish church. Lists losses by name, plus "They are not dead whose memory still lives within a nation's hearts".
WW1 Memorial window, Parish church.	Yes, 2006.	Stained glass window: "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life. To the memory of those who died on service in the Great War, 1914 -1918."
Individual memorial, Parish churchyard	Yes, 2006	Marble cross with anchor and chain in upper churchyard, to A.B. John William Helman, who died on from the effects of the raid at Zeebrugge. Memorial erected by the London Channel Islands Society Comforts Fund. Not recognised by C.W.G.C., but is currently being investigated as a possible case of non-commemoration. (Note that it also marks a burial, but as it is also a memorial erected by an official body, I have included it on the list.)
Individual memorial, Parish churchyard	Yes, 2006	Memorial to Thomas de Jersey Lainé, on family headstone. Also nearby, a headstone to his brother, Frank de Moulpied Lainé.
Grammar School Old Boys memorial, Grammar School, Les Varendes entrance.	Yes, 2006	Painted and carved wooden wall plaque inside Le Varendes entrance hall, listing by name and school number Old Boys who died on active service. Formerly in the Boys' Grammar School, Brock Rd, St Peter Port, moved to the new, mixed Grammar School in 1985.
Les Vauxbelets College Memorial.	Yes, 2007	Low granite wall in Rue Frairie entrance to what is now Blanchelande College, engraved with a gold star and the motto "Signum Fidei", followed by "Le Vauxbelets Memorial Playing Fields. In memory of the Old Boys of Les Vauxbelets College who fell in the 1914-18 and 1939-45 wars". No names.

St Martin's Parish

Parish War memorial, junction of Les Camps and Sausmarez Road.	Yes, 2005	Plaques around base of column list names of men lost, plus "In grateful memory of the men of St Martin's who died in the Great War, 1914 – 1918." Plaques in poor condition, and difficult to read. Memorial also inaccessible because it is on a busy junction, at the traffic lights on a blind bend. There has been some talk of moving it.

Individual memorial plaque inside Parish church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of “Bertram de Vic Carey, who “Fought against Germany and on June 2 nd 1920 passed from life to death”.
Individual memorial plaque inside Parish Church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of Captain Charles Percy Hill, 4 th Btn North Staffs, KIA Somme, 10/08/1916, also of 2 nd Lieut. Norman Ernest Albert Hill, W. Yorks Regt, who died at Penzance while serving his country” on 27 th March 1915. (2 nd Lieut. Hill is buried in St Martin’s New Cemetery).
Individual memorial in New Cemetery	Yes, 2005	Family headstone, including “Sacred to the memory of...Driver Cecil J Falla, dearly loved son of above, who died in “Southmead Hospital”, Bristol, on March 25 th 1918, in his 21 st year. “Now a soldier of Christ””.
Individual memorial in New Cemetery	Yes, 2005	Family headstone, including “In loving memory of....Pte Edward James Frampton, 1 st Service battalion, RGLI, only son of the above, who died prisoner of war in Germany, on the 27 th April 1918. (Note that Pte Frampton is buried in France, at Condé-sur- l’Escaut Communal cemetery. The cemetery report describes all CWGC casualties here as having “died in German hands”). The same headstone marks the burial of CSM AHC Frampton, also of the RGLI, who died on 14 th June 1920 “from an illness contracted on active service in Egypt”, aged 30 years.

Parish memorial, inside Parish church.	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque listing WW1 deaths by name. “To the glory of God and in memory of the men of St Sampson’s who gave their lives in the Great War”, plus “ Their name liveth for evermore”.
Parish war graves memorial	Yes, 2006	Plaque Inside churchyard wall commemorating WW1 burials in churchyard. (Note that not all headstones are now in the cemetery - it is likely that some were lost in quarry falls in the past).
Individual memorial in Parish churchyard	Yes, May 2006	Priaulx family headstone, including “In loving memory of....William Clifford, son of the above, killed in action April 1918, aged 23 years”.
Individual memorial in Parish churchyard	Yes, May 2006	Lawrence family headstone, including “Herbert Lawrence, Lance-Cpl, 1st Battalion RGLI, died of wounds at Cambrai, 6 th December 1918 (sic)”.
Individual memorial in	Yes, 2006	Shield shaped stone on base of family burial

Parish churchyard		plot, "In grateful remembrance of Reginald F. Leale, killed in action on the Somme, 10 th Oct 1916 and George D.B. Leale, died 29 th September 1922 from the effects of the war".
Individual memorial inside Parish church	Yes, May 2006	Brass eagle lectern inscribed "To the glory of God. For use in the Parish Church of St Sampson. In loving remembrance of one who gave his life for his country in the Great War. Frederick Reginald Leale, October 7 th 1916".
Individual memorial inside Parish church	Yes, May 2006	Brass wall plaque inscribed "In loving memory of Jack (George Dobrée Bell Leale), died September 29 th 1922, aged 34 years. From life to life immortal".
Capelles Methodist Church, individual memorial inside church.	Yes, June 2006	Marble wall plaque in memory of "Reuben John Ogier... tombée à Cambrai le 30 novembre 1917 âgé de 22 ans et 20 jours. Il en est ainsi, ô père parce que telle a été ta volonté. Témoignage d'affection érigé par la famille ». (Note that this is also a memorial to his father, who died in 1917 but not as a result of the war).
St Magloire R.C. church memorial.	Yes, January 2006	Plaque from the former St Magloire church, St Sampson (closed 1992), inscribed with a list of parishioners killed in WW1, plus " Aux soldats morts pour la Patrie, 1914-1918. Les paroissiens reconnaissants", now in St Joseph's presbytery gardens, St Peter Port. Visits by permission of the Parish priest.

Parish memorial in churchyard.	Yes, 2005	Granite obelisk behind church, with names of parishioners who died, plus "Morts pour la Patrie".
Emmanuel Baptist Church	No	Handwritten and framed roll of Honour. Contact Pastor Guilbert.
Zion Christian Fellowship, individual memorial inside church	Yes, 2007	Wall plaque in memory of A.J. Gavet, R.I.R., KIA Loos, 06/06/1916.

Parish memorial outside church, on green at Les Buttes.	Yes, 2005	Stone obelisk with list of men of the parish lost in the war, by name, rank and regiment. Plus " Érigé par les paroissiens à la mémoire de ceux qui ont donné leur vie pour leur patrie, 1914 – 1918 ».
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Torteval Parish

Parish memorial, outside church	Yes, 2006	Stone cross with names plus "In honoured and grateful memory of the men of Torteval who gave their lives for their country in the World Wars". "Their name liveth for evermore".
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Vale Parish

Parish memorial at Vale Avenue-Braye Road Cross Roads	Yes, 2005	Stone obelisk in railed small garden with names of parishioners who died plus "Vale War Memorial, 1914-18. Pro Patria."
Roll of honour, Ecole Baptiste des Landes (now deposited with the Guernsey Archive Service).	Yes, photographed by Mark Bougourd, June 2006.	Two documents, listing name, rank and regiment of all past pupils and "moniteurs" who served in the Great War, plus details of deaths, wounds etc. One lists volunteers, the other those who were called up to the RGLI "and other regiments".
St Paul's Methodist Church Memorial, Belval Road.	Yes, 2006	Carved marble plaque with pillars, entablature and wreath, engraved in black " A la mémoire de nos frères qui ont donné leur vie durant la Grande guerre, 1914 – 1918". Mounted on dark wood, and fixed on wall inside church.
Individual memorial in Parish Cemetery	Yes, 2005	Marble cross on base, engraved with crest of RIR, and "In loving memory of our dearly loved and only son Lance-Cpl Henry J. Bisson, M.M., n.q.s. Guernsey contingent, 6 th Royal Irish Regt, killed in action at Guinchy, France while fighting for his King and country, September 9 th 1916, aged 30 years. Deeply regretted. Greater love hath no man than to lay down his life for his friends".
Individual memorial in Parish Cemetery	Yes, 2006	Family headstone including an inscription in memory of "Private George Thomas Domaille, 26 th Battalion Canadian Inf., killed in action in France, October 19 th 1918. Rest in Peace".
Individual memorial in Parish cemetery	Yes, 2006	Granite cross in memory of 3 Stranger brothers In proud and loving memory of the three sons of William and Ellen Stranger, Easterbrook, St Sampson, who gave their lives for Britain's cause in the Great War, and passed on to the fuller life. Pte Frank Stranger, AIF, age 35, died of wounds March 22 nd 1918. 2 nd Lieut. George Stranger, RGLI, age 23, killed in action 11 th April 1918, Capt. Harry Easterbrook Stranger, MC, RGLI, age 26, died of wounds 11 th May 1918". Until we meet again".
Individual memorial in	Yes, 2005	Shield "In loving memory of Cpl Louis Drouet,

Parish Cemetery		R.G.L.I, who fell in action at Cambrai on the 23 rd November 1917, aged 21 years. His king and country called him. That call was not in vain. On Britain's Roll of Honour, You'll find our dear one's name. Dearly loved and deeply mourned".

Bailiwick Memorial and Field of Remembrance, top of Smith Street.	Yes, 2005	Bailiwick memorial with statue and 5 panels listing men from the islands of the bailiwick who died in WW1. Also "The Great War 1914-1918. This memorial commemorates those who at the call of King and Country left all that was dear to them, endured hardness, faced danger and finally passed out of the sight of men, by the path of duty and self sacrifice giving up their own lives that others might live in freedom. Let those who come after see to it that their names be not forgotten". On the back: "This memorial was erected by the people of Guernsey and unveiled on September 19 th 1926 by Major General the Honourable Sir Charles Sackville West. K.B.E, C.B., C.M.B., Lieutenant Governor."(Photo of unveiling in Priaulx library Collection)
Parish Memorial, one copy in the Constables' Office, Lefebvre Street, the other in the doorway of Checkers Superstore, Admiral Park.	Yes, 2006	Wooden triptych style wall plaques with 5 columns of names and ranks of parishioners killed in WW1. Headed "For God, King and Country. Diex Aie." A coloured St Peter Port crest, with "Roll of Honour", and the dates 1914 and 1919 inside green laurel wreaths on either side.
Individual memorial plaque inside Town Church	Yes, 2005	Wall plaque in memory of Eric d'Auvergne Collins, KIA at the Somme, 23/08/1916. Also original wooden grave marker, poem, copy of magazine article and photograph of cemetery where he is buried (Quarry Cemetery, Montauban)
Individual memorial plaque inside Town church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of Cecil Francis Crousaz, KIA at 1 st battle of Ypres, 31/10/1914.
Individual memorial plaque inside Town church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of Major Edward d'Albret La Mottée, D.S.O., KIA at Loos, 27/09/1915
Individual memorial plaque inside Town church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of Lt. Commander Donald Priaulx McGregor, R.N., K.I.A. Kusu Bay, 20/01/1918.

St John’s Church cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2005	Marble cross above base with “To the sacred memory of Eric Alfred, Sgt, R.G.L.I., killed at the battle of Cambrai, France, Dec. 1 st 1917. Eldest son of A.J. and A.L. Hotton. Faithful unto death”.
St John’s Church cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2005	Family headstone, including Sapper Henry C. W. Osborne, who died of wounds in France, 02/06/1918.
St John’s Church cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2005	Family headstone, including Wilfred J. Mitchell, killed in France 03/09/1916, age 25 years. “Thy will be done”.

Wesleyan Methodist Church, Bouet	Yes, 2007	Two small wooden plaques inside new vestry to the left of main entrance to church. List of names plus “In Sacred memory 1914” on top plaque, “In Sacred Memory 1918” on lower plaque.
St Stephen’s Parish memorial, St Stephen’s Church, Les Gravées	Yes, 2006	Wooden triptych on stand inside church, with “In memory of those who gave their lives for their Country in the Great War, 1914-1918”, and list of names. Recently renovated. Embroidered kneeler with poppies, crosses and “Remember” in front.
Individual memorial inside St Stephen’s Church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of Major Francis de Beauvoir Bell, 2 nd Btn, Norfolk Regt, who died of wounds on 24/04/1915 at Basra, Mesopotamia.
St Joseph’s R.C. church, individual memorial inside church	Yes, 2006	Wall plaque in memory of Captain Walter A. Carnegie Bowden-Smith, 4 th Btn Royal Fusiliers, wounded at Mons, died at Maissieres convent, Belgium.
St Joseph’s Presbytery Garden	Yes, 2006	Crucifix with plaque from the former St Magloire church, St Sampson (closed 1992). Inscribed with a list of parishioners killed in WW1, plus “ Aux soldats morts pour la Patrie, 1914-1918. Les paroissiens reconnaissants”.
St Joseph’s Presbytery Garden	Yes, 2006	Crucifix with plaque from the former St Yves church, Forest, attached to base. Inscribed with a list of parishioners killed in WW1, plus “pro Patria, 1914 – 1918”.
Notre Dame du Rosaire	Yes, May 2008	Memorial is kept in storage and only brought out on Remembrance Sunday.

Roll of Honour, Elizabeth College, The Grange	Yes , 2006	Large wall plaque in school hall commemorating Old Elizabethans who fell in the Great War. Wooden background, names engraved and gilded. 2 small enamel plaques at base depicting War and Peace.
Oddfellows memorial, Oddfellows Hall, Lefebvre Street.	Yes, 2005	Wooden wall plaque above stairs in Oddfellows Hall, listing members of Loyal Pride of Sarnia Lodge who died in WW1, by name, rank and regiment .
Guns by Victoria Tower	Yes, 2006	Two German field guns, of four presented to the island at the end of WW1. In the care of Museums service.
Outside Fort George Military Cemetery	Yes, 2005	After the 1914-1918 War, a Cross of Sacrifice and a memorial plaque were erected in honour of all members of His Majesty's Forces buried in Guernsey, Alderney and Sark. The cross is inscribed with "Their glory shall not be blotted out", while the memorial plaque states:- "The Cross of Sacrifice is erected to the honoured memory of those members of His Majesty's Forces who gave their lives during the wars of 1914-1918 and 1939-1945 and are buried in the islands of Guernsey, Alderney and Sark"
Candie Cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2005/6	Red granite obelisk on large stone base, with smaller obelisks on corners. Family memorial, including inscription in memory of "Leofwin Fellowes Lukis, Lt. RFC, 1898 – 1917,
Candie Cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2005/6	Family headstone including memorial to "Gunner Bert Strappini, RFA, who fell in action at Messines, Belgium on the 9 th June 1917, age 20 years. Interred at Armentières. Till we meet in the morning".
Candie Cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2005/6	Family headstone including memorial to "Stanley Piprell, of the 7 th East Kents, died on August 24 th 1918 at St Sever Hospital, Rouen, aged 30 years and 8 months".
Foulon Cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Family memorial in the form of a large block of granite and carved ivy and doves (broken and almost illegible" including memorial to "Brian E. Hill, Captain, Royal Tank Corps, killed in action October 12 th 1918, aged 22 years".
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Marble shield, leaning on base of marble cross: "In loving memory of Cecil F. de la Rue, son of F.H. de la Rue, 7 th R.I. Fusiliers, killed near Ypres, August 16 th 1917. Until the day breaks". (Inscription very faded).

Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Shield at base of family headstone, "Robert E. Taylor, Lewis gun section, H.A.C., died for his country at Bullecourt, France, 15 th May 1917, aged 21".
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Above chapel, horizontal cross set in grass, inscribed "Captain E.G. Ozanne, 3 rd Batt, Royal Fusiliers, killed in action 14 th Feb 1915".
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Family headstone includes memorial to "Pte John Croucher, King's Own Royal Lancaster Regt, who fell in France on 8 th May 1915, aged 31 years".
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Granite block and fallen cross, "In loving memory of Theodore David Parks, Capt., South Staffs Regt, killed in action and buried at Polygon Wood, Flanders, 5 th October 1917, aged 25". (Inaccessible and almost illegible – this is a best transcript from a photograph.)
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Family stone in the form of a granite Celtic cross, including memorial to "Francis George Ross, Captain, Royal Irish Regiment, youngest son of Major General Mockler, who was killed on the 1 st of July 1916 in the battle of the Somme, aged 26 years".
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2006	Family headstone including memorial to "No. 491123 Pte H.C. Farr, 4 th Canadian Btn, killed in action near Lens, July 30 th 1917 in his 25 th year. He loved honour more than he loved himself".
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2007	Moylan family headstone, marking the burial of CPO T. Moylan, Royal Australian Navy, but also commemorating "Boy M. Moylan, (next line illegible) died in Leics on January 26 th 1916 in his 14 th year.
Foulon cemetery, individual memorial	Yes, 2007	Amos family headstone, including memorial to "Gunnr Rodney F. Amos, the only and beloved son of the above, killed in action on the 21 st May 1918 aged 19 years, buried at Sally le Bourse, France. Another hero safely home".
